
Return to Peacetime causes new problems to arise




- Scandals make their way through Harding's Presidency

husbands to drink.





LANDS TWO MEN IN JAIL.


TEAPOT DOME WY.- Secretary of the Interior, Albert Fall was involved in a big scandal in Teapot Dome, Wyoming. Fall is in control of the federal oil reserve in Teapot Dome. Fall leased the reserves to two oil companies, as a result, Fall and a relative of his received cattle and gifts worth \$385,000. He was convicted of the crime and fined \$100,000 and sentenced to a year in jail.

The 18<sup>th</sup> Amendment now in effect.

January 16, 1920 - The Eighteenth Amendment is now in effect. This amendment establishes prohibition and bans any sale, manufacturing, or transportation of alcohol. Over 500,000 people were arrested for violating prohibition. The 18<sup>th</sup> Amendment formed speakeasies. Speakeasies are secret illegal groups that serve alcohol to public.

"MODEL T IS created"

Henry Ford founded the Ford Motor Company in 1903. Tim and his engineers designed the model T. It is a durable, easy to repair vehicle that only comes in black. Ford uses assembly lines to increase production speed and lower the cost. This company offers workers an eight-hour work day and hires African, and disabled people. The automobile industry will create jobs in the steel, rubber, glass, and paint industry.

XENOPHOBIA CASE  
IS THE CAUSE OF TWO  
DEATHS.

MASSACHUSETTS-TWO  
FOREIGNERS FROM ITALY WERE  
CHARGED WITH ROBBING A MASS.  
SHOE FACTORY AND KILLING THE PAYROLL  
CLERK AND GUARD ON MAY 5<sup>TH</sup>, ALTHOUGH  
THE STATE DIDN'T HAVE SOLID PROOF. SOME  
PEOPLE THOUGHT THAT THE MEN WERE ACCUSED  
OF THE CRIME BECAUSE THEY WERE ANAR-  
CHISTS. A LOT OF PEOPLE FOUGHT FOR  
THEIR RIGHTS BUT THEY WERE CON-  
VICTED AND SENTENCED TO DEATH.

THEY WERE EXECUTED AUGUST 23,  
1987. THIS INCIDENT CAUSED THE  
AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION  
TO FORM.
